2. Just west of the house at 545 W. 63rd is a mural. What are the people riding the train all reading?



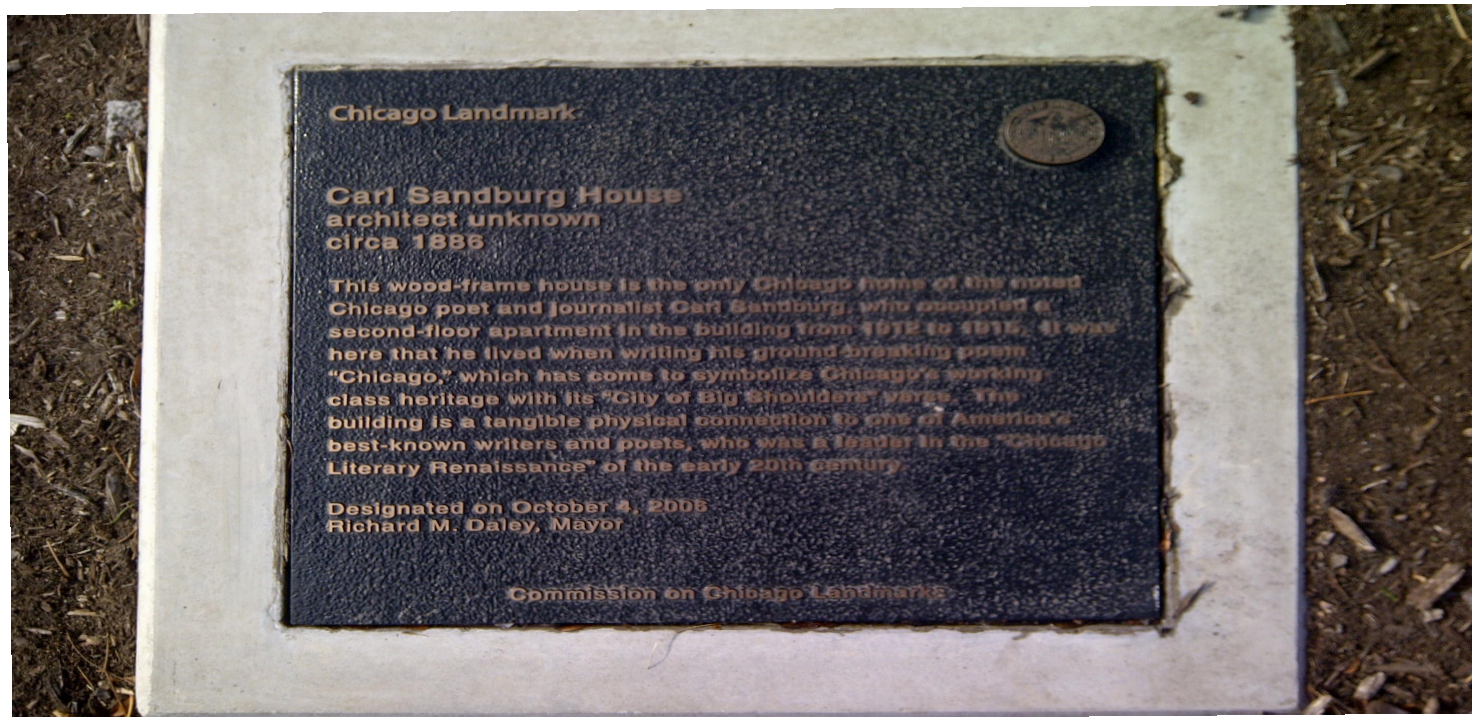

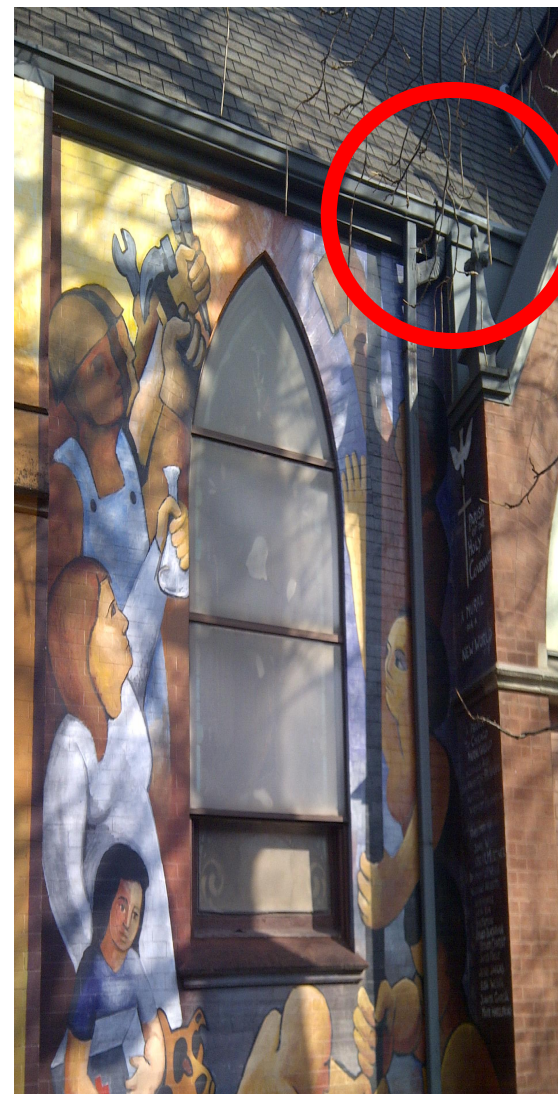

10. The Frankie Machine Garden, 1800 W. Haddon, is named after the protagonist of Nelson Algren's *The Man with the Golden Arm*. As a tribute to Frankie's career running casino games, there's a pair of dice on the sign. What number to they show?



11. On the northwest corner of Devon and Fairfield, you'll find a reader. Below him, what are you instructed not to do?



12. Poetry Slam was invented at the Green Mill, 4802 North Broadway. Who is pictured just inside the door holding a saxophone?



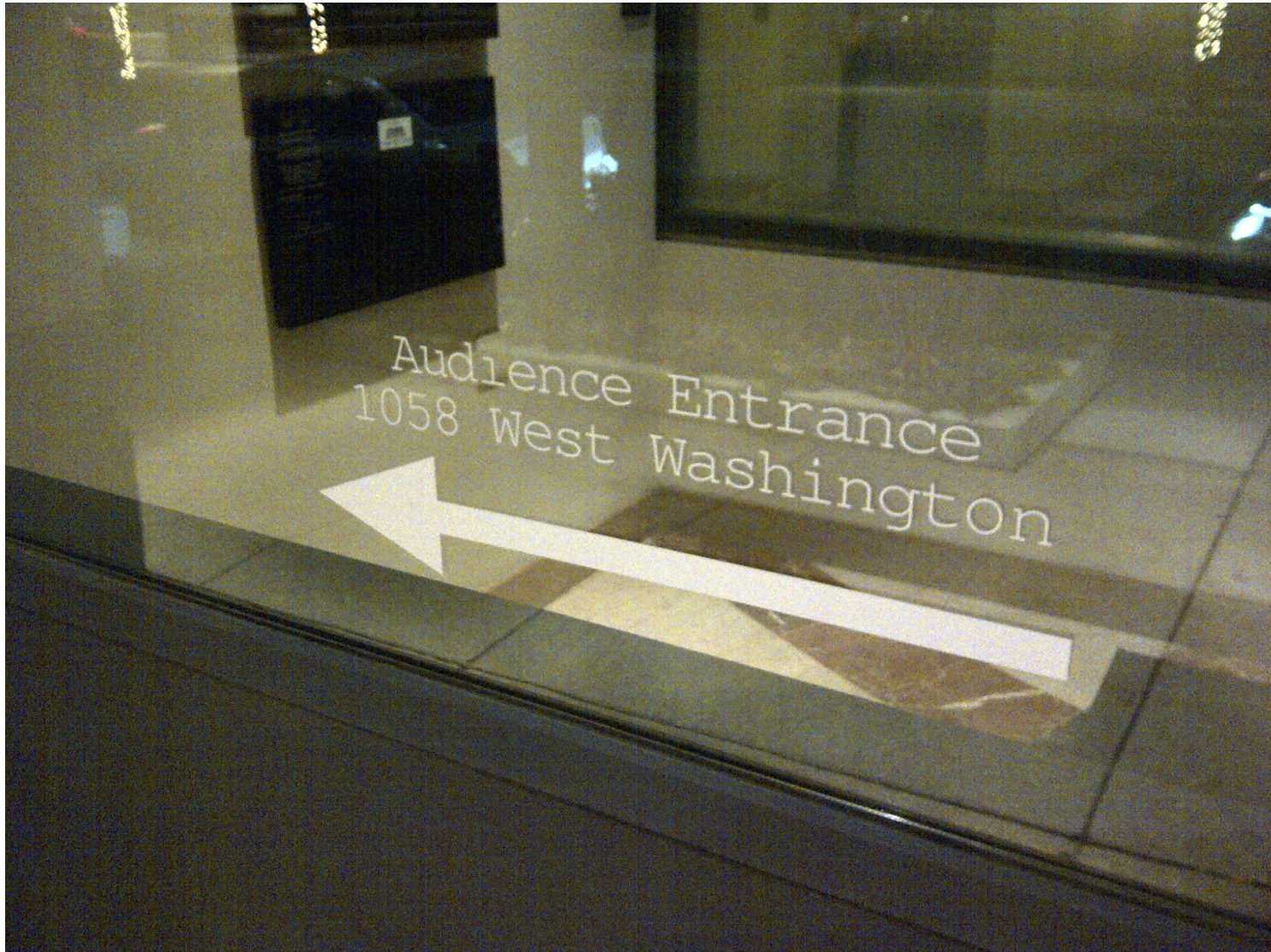

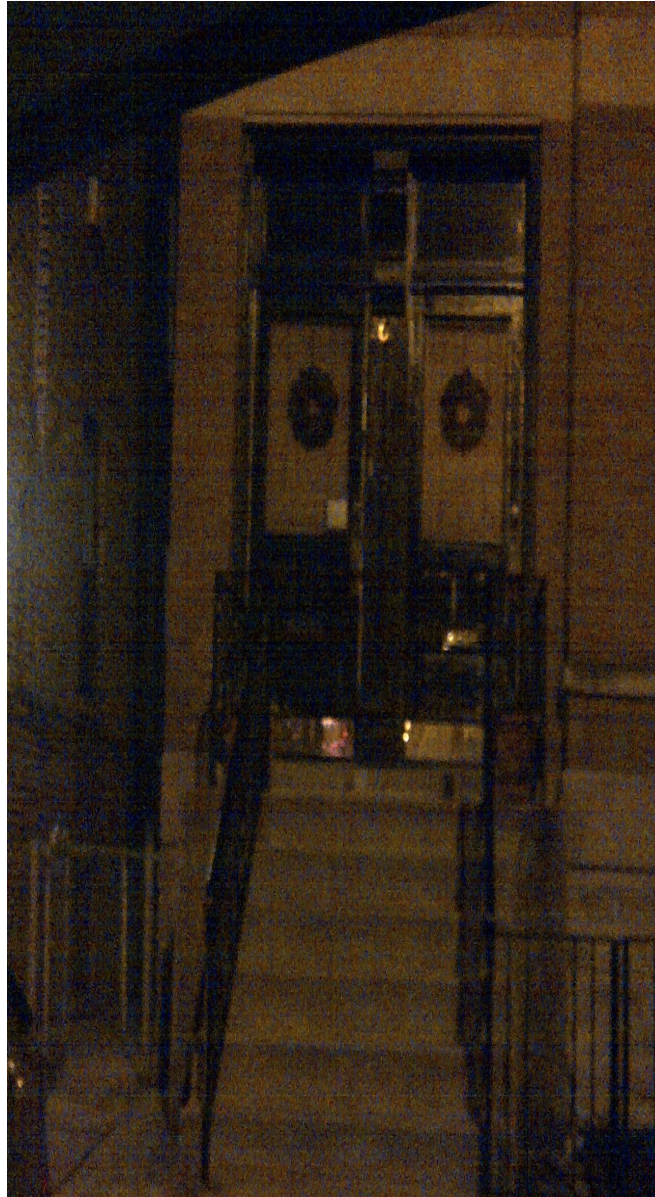

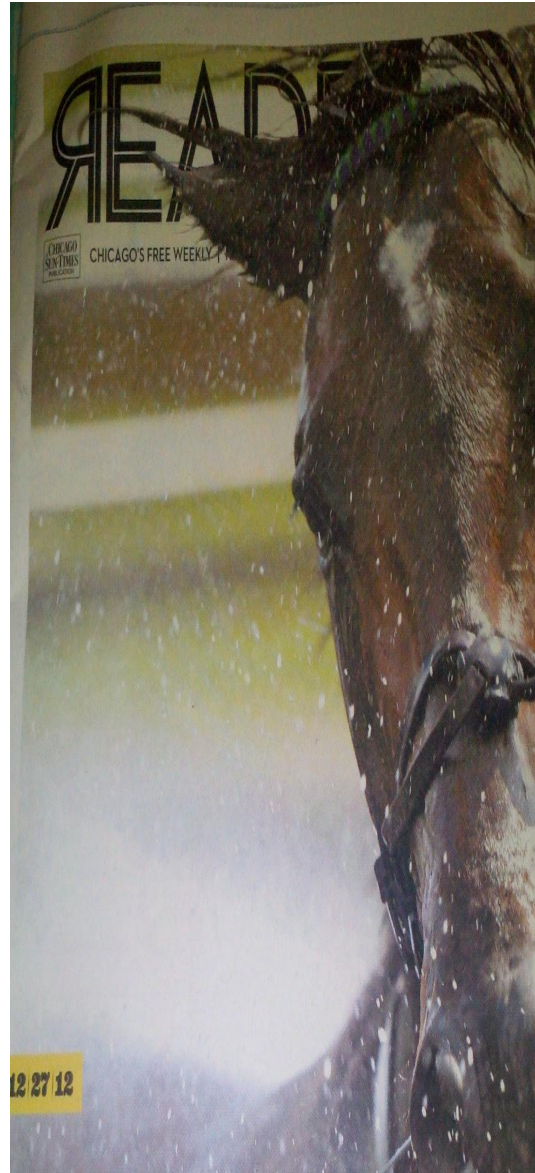


22. Adam Langer's *Crossing California* is one of the newer critically acclaimed books coming out of Chicago. It focuses on Jewish families in West Rodgers Park, all of whom attend synagogue at Ner Tamid, 2754 W. Rosemont. What year was it built?

26. *Devil in the White City*, one of the most popular recent books set in Chicago, tells the story of a serial killer living in our fair city during the Columbian Exposition. H.H.Holmes built his “murder castle” at 611 W. 63rd Street, a site that is now a post office. According to the yellow sign to the right of the door, what else does the building serve as?



27. Women and Children First, 5233 North Clark, is a bookstore selling publications by and about women, as well as children's books (surprise!). According to a sign in their door, what would they like you to do with cell phones?



28. The Associated Negro Press, founded in Chicago in 1919, was the largest news service to black newspapers in America, though they also had 75 papers in Africa on their subscription list. Located at 3507 S. King Drive, their old entrance is now an unmarked door. Who is advertised in stickers on the light pole out front? Bonus: Which rally organizer did he used to work with?



29. In *Miami and the Siege of Chicago*, Herman Mailer describes the 1968 democratic convention, including the riots, as seen from his window at the Chicago Hilton, 720 S Michigan. Hopefully, you'll see a much calmer scene today and can tell us how many pine trees you notice between Balbo and the fountain at 8th Street.

A FEW REASONS WHY

1. Ida B. Wells as a great pioneer civic worker devoted 38 years of service to the elevation of her race.
2. She fought lynching through the press and from the platform.
3. In 1893 Ida B. Wells organized the first colored Woman's Club in Illinois and is recognized as the "Mother" of the Illinois Association of Colored Women.
4. Ida B. Wells with the aid of Jane Addams stopped the establishment of separate schools in Chicago.
5. She founded the Negro Fellowship League, the Alpha Suffrage Club and many other civic organizations.
6. She gained audiences with President McKinley to protest against lynching and conferred with President Wilson about discrimination against Negroes in Federal employ.

33. “Drinking and Writing” is a show performed at the bar at Hopleaf, 5148 N. Clark. What beer is advertised in the bottom right-most window?



34. *Divergent* is a popular series of young adult books set in a future version of Chicago, with much of the action taking place at the Sears Tower (we'll never call it by any other name!). 37. Powell's Bookstore is a Chicago chain. What newspaper can you find outside of their store at 1218 S Halsted?



38. Mather High School is another location that features prominently in *Crossing California*. What will you find at the south end of the parking lot, approximately 5850 N California?



39. One of Chicago's most famous residents is a best selling author. While we're not actually going to make you go to Barak Obama's house at 5046 S Greenwood (we already encouraged you to not get arrested!), we're going to make you get close. Who does his honorary street sign pay tribute to?



40. Robert Abbot founded the Chicago Defender, which was one of only three African-American daily newspapers in the United States. What is pictured on the mailbox in front of his house at 4742 S King Drive?



42. Edgar Rice Burroughs, the creator of Tarzan, was born in Chicago and lived as a child at 1943 W Washington. The house is no longer there- it's a parking lot for the United Center. There's a sign for Red Top Parking- what does the message in the arrow read?



43. City Hall appears in many of the books covered in this rally. Just north of the entrance at 121 N LaSalle, there's a carving of a man with a fish. What is behind them?



44. We're sure you know that Upton Sinclair's *The Jungle* is all about the terrible conditions that existed in the slaughterhouses. There's a bull on the entrance gate at Halsted and Exchange. What color are his eyes?



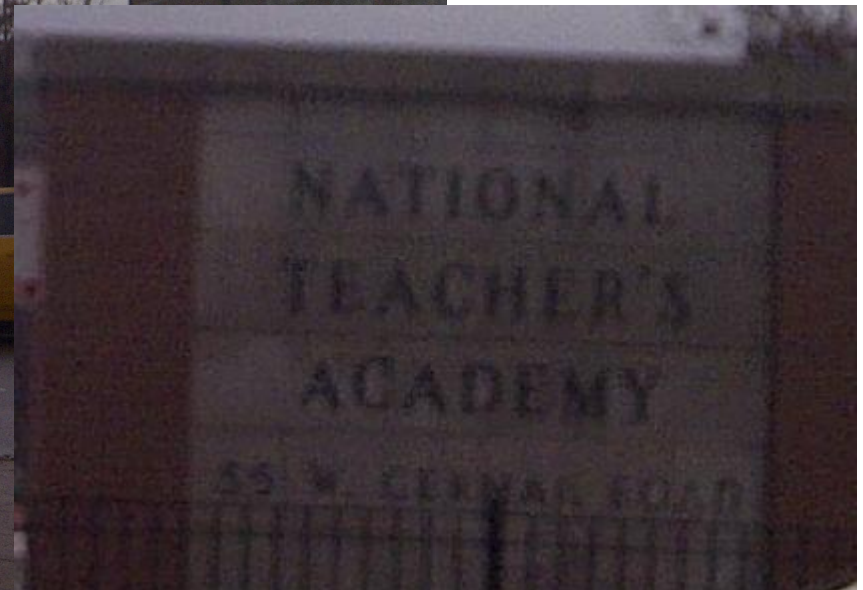
45. There's plenty of specialty bookstores to be found in our fair city, including Islamic Books N Things at Devon and Washtenaw. Look across the street - what do I like?

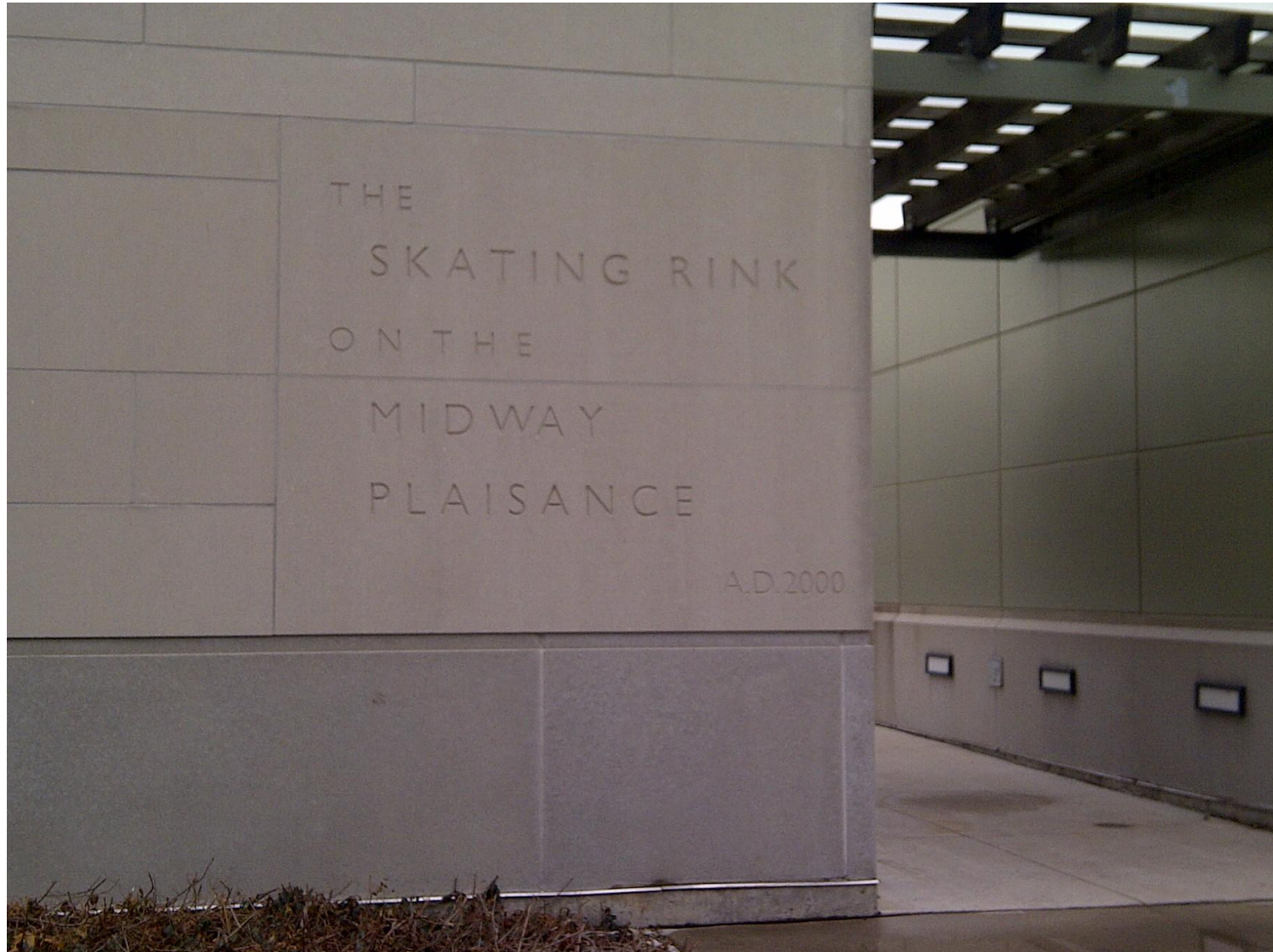

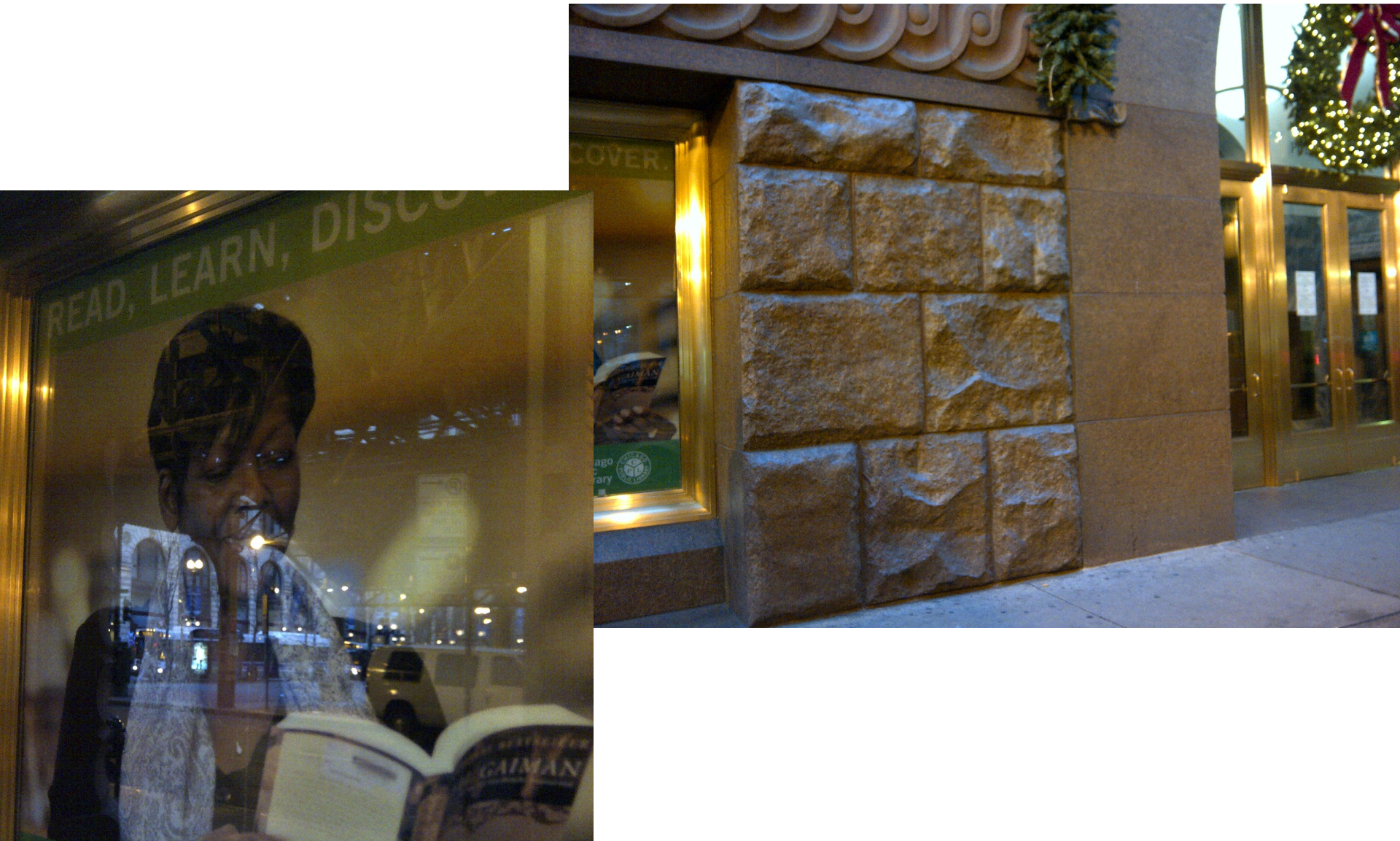

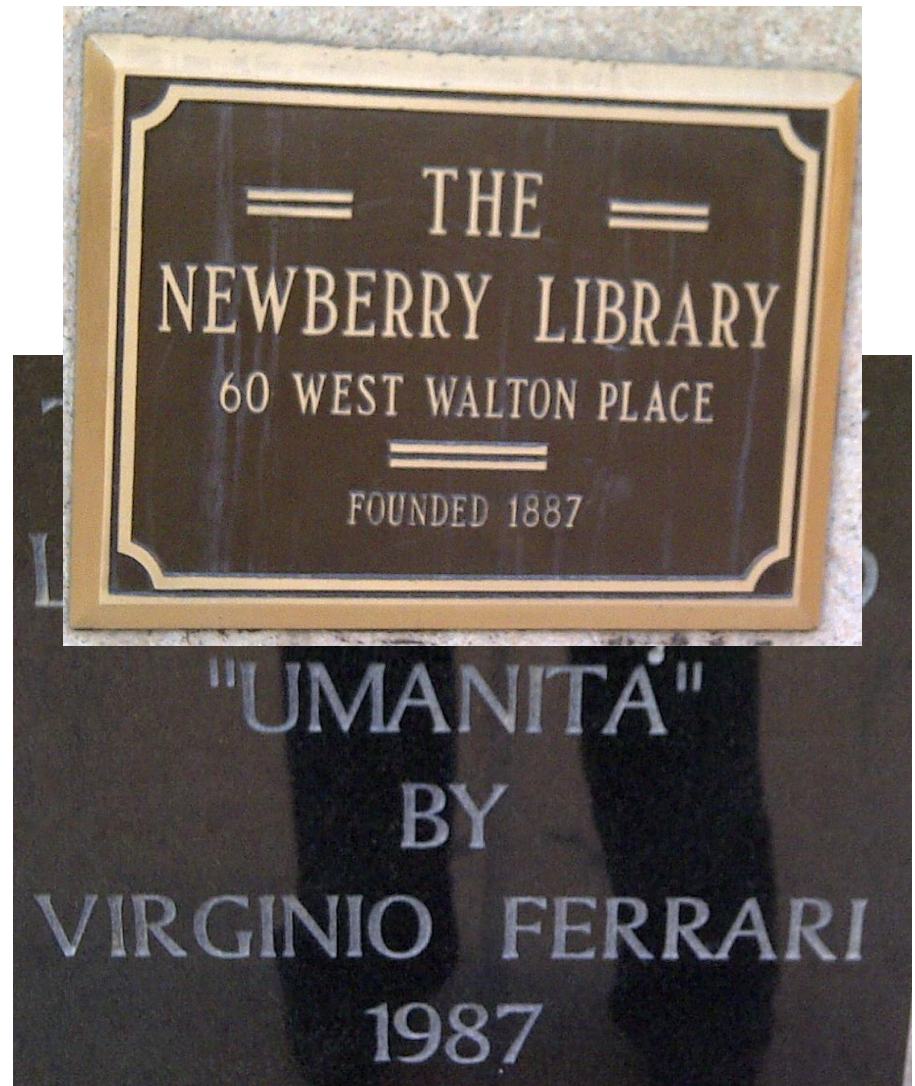

67. Poetry, the magazine, is headquartered in Chicago at 61 W Superior. Who is a friend and benefactor of poetry?

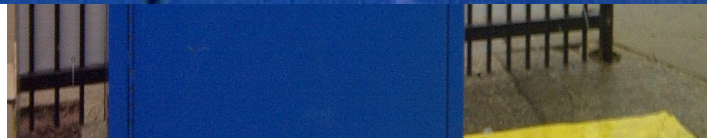
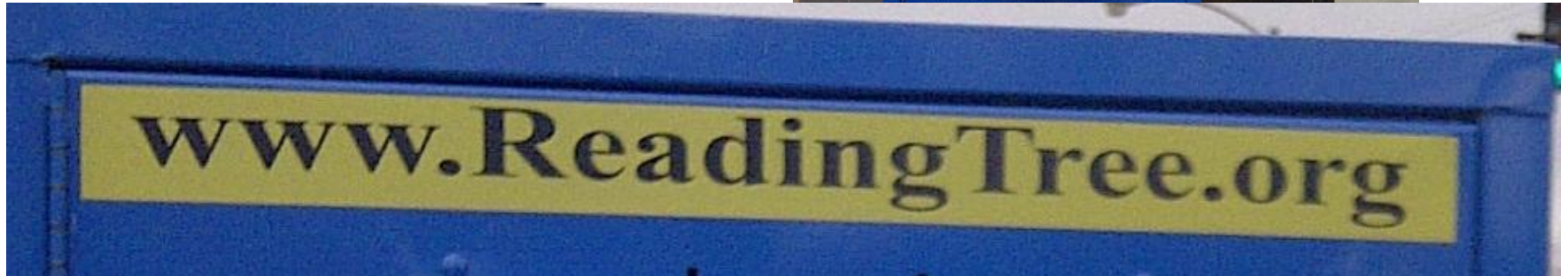

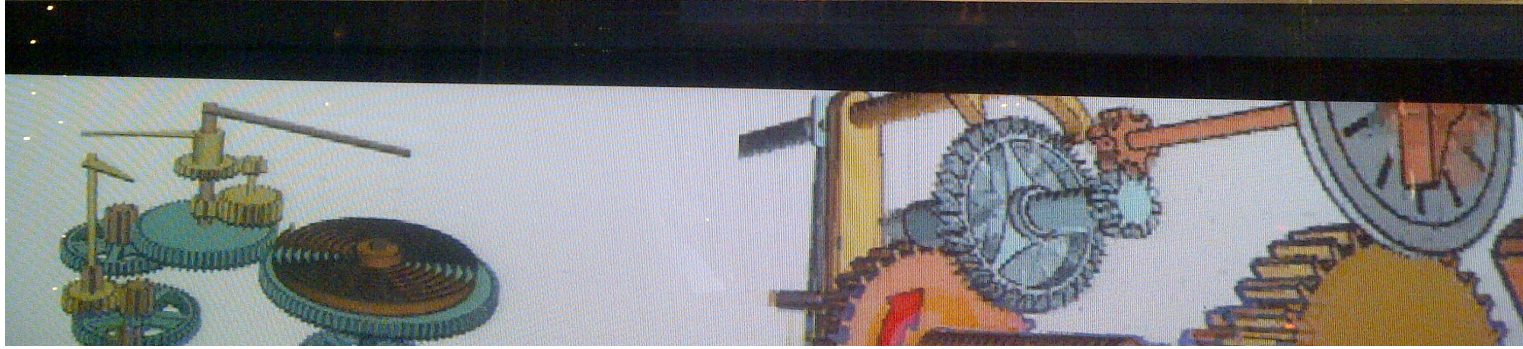


69. Frank Norris's *The Pit* centers around the action at the Board of Trade, 141 W. Jackson. What entrance would they prefer you use?
